#### WHOSE SON IS HE?

I hope your Thanksgiving was filled with family, friends, food and the opportunity to count your blessings with thanks to God. It is good to give God our thanks and praise. Acknowledgement of the Lord's provision in

our lives can be a heartfelt offering of worship. Certainly the Lord is worthy of our worship.

Now our attention is drawn to the celebration of Christmas. Excitement, joy, hope, generosity, and goodwill all seem to well up within us. We begin the countdown to Christmas Day and our plans begin to reveal the expectation of our heart. The remembrance of our Savior's birth is the heartbeat that guides our devotion for Christmas.

As we consider the life of Christ, I invite you to take a moment to consider this question: "WHO IS JESUS, WHOSE SON IS HE?"

Jesus asked this question of the religious leaders in Matthew 22:41-46:

### "WHAT DO YOU THINK ABOUT THE MESSIAH, WHOSE SON IS HE?"

The religious leaders knew the Messiah was identified in Scripture as the son of David. This answer can be determined by tracing the lineage of descendants from David as recorded in Scripture. The Messiah as descendant of David identifies with the human condition and so he is referred to as the Son of Man in Scripture.

Now there is also another answer that identifies the Messiah. He is the Son of God.

That answer comes through revelation of the Holy Spirit. The Son of God is the incarnation of God in a man named Jesus. So Jesus is deity as well as a man.

As deity of God, Jesus manifests the authority of God in a world that only recognizes the authority of man. When you accept Jesus as the deity of God, you will see Christmas as the royal birth of the prince of peace.

The reign of God is breaking into this world as the Isaiah prophesied:

For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

<sup>7</sup> Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end.

He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever.

The zeal of the LORD Almighty will accomplish this. Isaiah 9:6-7

This Advent and Christmas prepare to receive the coming of a King who will dwell within you to accomplish justice, righteousness, and peace here and now.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

We were learning about Joseph interpreting Pharaoh's dreams in Genesis 41 including the seven sickly cows (seven years of famine) eating the seven healthy cows (seven years of plenty). We were thinking about how strange it was to dream of cows eating cows when the Holy Spirit guided us back to Genesis 1:30 where God provided plants to be the food of every animal. Imagine carnivores like wolves may have been eating grass next to sheep. This may bother evolutionists, but God knew the end from the beginning. He knew man would sin and bring suffering. He designed and created predators before they were needed to limit suffering by removing sickly animals from the herd and preventing the spread of disease. ## It's PEANUT BRITTLE SEASON!! and here is the history of St. John's Peanut Brittle Project as told by Henrietta Kriesel.

It started in the old church building where Alice Voight was president of the Afternoon Women's Guild which numbered about 100 members. After obtaining this recipe from friends in Elkhart, Alice asked Ruth Shedrow to make it along with help from Henrietta Kriesel. They made the recipe in the old church hall on 9th Street and soon Clara Ruggles joined them. Because

Ruth was headed to Florida, Clara took over this project. The project grew larger and soon other women joined this cause: Lena Cashbaugh, Van Drew, Flo Aldenettal, Mabel Gerke, Clara LaBorn, Mabel Edlen, Mabel Schlundt, Frieda Helsing, Janice Schlundt, and later Emma Jean Kinsey. (Henrietta thinks there were other helpers but did not have a complete list of names.)

Henrietta noticed the date of March 17, 1967 on her recipe card which may be the date the recipe was copied OR when they first made the recipe. Clara was the authority on cooking the brittle and would taste a peanut to see if it was cooked or if they needed to turn the gas down!! After Clara, Janice Schlundt took over the project for many years.

It is Henrietta's hope that we can keep the project going here at St. John's!!

We thank you, Henrietta for all your help and service to this project!!
